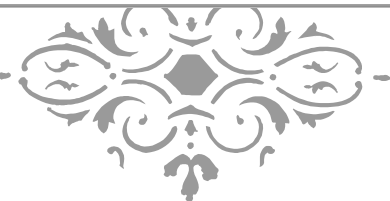

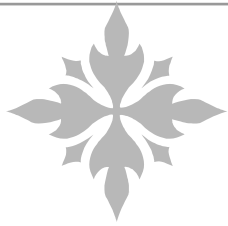

JUNG, BUDDHISM, AND PHENOMENOLOGY

CHRIS AANSTOOS

LECTURE: Interesting convergences between phenomenology and Jungian thought have recently begun to be explored. But, in general, little cross-pollination has actually occurred. Partly this is due to the usual inertia of academic life: it is so difficult to master even one tradition that it is rare for a scholar to master three with enough depth to genuinely cross-fertilize each with the others. But, as we now reach the end of modernity's reign and face the utter, ecological necessity to transcend elementistic thinking, it is vital that we gather those voices of holism, and listen carefully to their integral essential core.

EMBODIED DREAM IMAGERY

LECTURE: Embodied dream imagery uses techniques based on the spontaneous ability of memory to flashback into previous events. During a flashback, the experienced environment is viscerally and tangibly present. Once a dreamer has flashed back into the dreaming environment, the experienced events can be slowed down dramatically. This forces the dream states into the body, where they manifest as embodied states. Using sense memory techniques gleaned from acting, it becomes possible to experience a variety of embodied states simultaneously.

LECTURE: Stories inspire and shape our lives, from the archetypal dramas we unconsciously enact, to the jokes we make about the boss at work. Examples show a way out a profound grasp of the psychology of story as we liberate ourselves from stuck scripts by journeying through five fundamental genres of story: myth, fact, fairy tale, legend, and the favored tale.

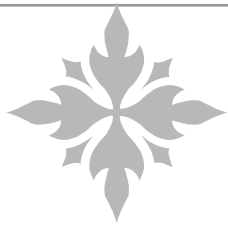
WORKSHOP: For many of us, traditional concepts of God, and the religious systems on which these ideas are built, have less and less meaning. This workshop describes a depth psychological approach to spirituality that is based purely on personal experience and individual psychology, without recourse to theological or other preconceived ideas about the nature of God.

LECTURE: While tourists circumambulate the globe at record rates, pilgrimage - the transformation journey to a sacred site - is enjoying a revival not seen since the Middle Ages. His slides and discussion survey several pilgrimage models, including Aborigine, Native American, Islamic, and Christian, as well as secular examples, such as meaningful visits to museums, artist's homes, and battlefields. The presentation also explores a number of practices that can turn ordinary journeys into sacred travel, and everyday life into a daily pilgrimage.

JUNGIAN DREAM ENACTMENT

PETER ELTING

LECTURE: Dreams can be dark or bright, synchronous, meaningful, and/or prophetic. We can put many words to this wondrous and mysterious language of the unconscious. In this lecture, Dr. Elting discusses the tenets of Jungian dream-work, with a specific focus on active imagination and J. L. Moreno's theories of psychodrama and enactment. Through enactment, emotions often surface more readily than in the usual associative process of psychotherapy. Enactment increases our understanding of the dream drama. As we increase our capacity for creative spontaneity, complexes and shadow move more into the authentic here and now.

In this talk Nor Hall tells the story of Salomé's ideas and how they developed in the same European cradle that birthed depth psychology. .

A VISION OF EVIL

LECTURE: Western civilization has sharply divided good and evil, light and darkness, the wicked and the sacred. This artificial dichotomy produces religious, social and political polarization. It allows the development of simplistic psychological formulations that are more about moralism than science or personal experience. The subject is approached through psychological, mythological and theological perspectives. This lecture attempts to grasp elements of evil as essential to our wholeness and as prelude to the sacred in our lives.

EARLY TRAUMA AND DREAMS

LECTURE: Experiences in early childhood that cause unbearable psychic pain or anxiety can leave the personality and the human spirit threatened with destruction. To avoid this, a defensive splitting of the self occurs in which a "progressed" part of the self casts a spell over a "regressed" part and locks it up in an inner sanctum for safekeeping. In this lecture, using dream examples from the clinical situation and the fairy tale of Rapunzel, we will see how the wisdom of the psyche's archetypal defenses saves the imperishable personal spirit from further trauma, but at the price of cutting it off from life.

TRANSFORMATIONAL PROCESS IN
THE PSYCHOANALYSIS OF TRAUMA

WORKSHOP: Patients who have suffered severe early trauma often find themselves bewitched by dark tyrannical voices assailing them from within, leading to intense anxiety and depression. In dream work with such patients, the dark inner voices reveal themselves as both archaic and typical—hence archetypal—personifications whose inner purpose seems to be the defense of a vulnerable core of selfhood to make sure it is never violated again. In defending the true self against further trauma, the archetypal defenses also persecute and demoralize it, cutting off all hope for life-in-relationship to others.

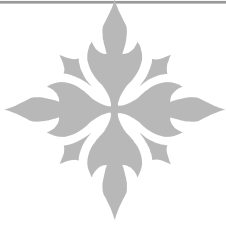

THE ARCHETYPE OF WHOLENESS

JOHN MARTIN

LECTURE: Martin understands this archetype to be synonymous with the Archetypal Self or the God-image. He looks at Jung's interpretation of the God-image as containing both good and evil.
